Marigold Class

English—We are enjoying our text, Troll Swap. We have been pretending to be disgusting trolls to help us think of words to describe them and their caves. We have written about How to be a Troll. Year 2 are working especially hard with their handwriting as they have started to join letters!

Maths—Reception have been working hard this week counting carefully and starting to recognise numbers. Year 1 have also been counting carefully to 10 and have been solving problems with reasoning. Year 2 have been counting tens and ones and solving problems.

History—We have started to learn about Queen Victoria and when she was alive. We looked at her family tree and how it leads to King Charles II. We have created our own family tree.

Vines and Branches—We have started our new Vines and Branches unit and have been learning all about the Bible, how special it in and all of the different books that up the Old and New Testament.

Buddy Time—We met our new year 6 buddies this week. We read a story about the Rainforest and then created animals and plants to create a Rainforest display.



Tulip Class

This week, Tulip class have started reading the first few pages of Seal Surfer, spotting prepositions in Year 3 and fronted adverbials in Year 4. We have also been researching information about seals so that we can write our own reports! Did you know that baby seals have already developed 70% of their brains?

In Maths, we have continued our work on Place Value. Year 3 have been partitioning numbers within 1,000, whilst year 4 have progressed to 10,000. Pupils have also enjoyed setting each other some tricky maths challenges.

In Science, we continued to look at rocks and started to classify them depending on how rough, smooth, hard, soft, dark and light they are. We also discussed how each rock is used in day-to-day life.

We started our Geography topic this week, asking ourselves: are all settlements the same? We started making leaflets to teach people the differences between villages, towns and cities. We looked at some photos from Kingsley, Frodsham and Chester, and talked about what you can do in each place. We are excited to continue with these next week and consider how these places are connected.



Bluebell Class

We've had another wonderful week in Bluebell Class and it is great to see everyone enjoying their learning, settling in to the new routines and embracing the challenges of their new year group's curriculum. We have enjoyed reading more of our English text this week and have used the book as inspiration to write setting descriptions and use expanded noun phrases effectively. The key focus was to ensure that concise vocabulary choices were made and an additional challenge was set to write a story of just 100 words making sure that all words are chosen for the intended purpose.

On Wednesday, Year 5 went on a very exciting trip to Safety Central. Throughout the day, they participated in different workshops that focused on keeping safe in different scenarios from everyday life. There were lots of important messages shared with the children about how to keep themselves and others safe.

We are incredibly proud of the Year 6 Junior Leader candidates who presented their manifestos to the whole school. Throughout the week, the children have been voting for who they would like to be part of the Junior Leadership Team this year and we have shared the results with the whole school this morning. Congratulations to our newly elected Junior Leaders. Thank you to all candidates who put themselves forward; each have been given a special ambassador role to support our school community throughout the year.
