We are so proud of our children in Marigold Class this week for their bravery and resilience during their first residential trip! They all slept in bunk beds in cabins with their friends and were very excited to snuggle down in their sleeping bags.

First, we did some team-building activities in the woods with blindfolds, and we had to guide each other around the trees. After lunch, we put on our harnesses and helmets to zoom on the zip line! We also built huge crate stacks to climb up and swing down.

We were independent at teatime, serving our friends their meals, cleaning the tables, and sweeping the floor. Next, we got our warm clothes and torches and went into the dark woods for a night-time walk. We saw stars, the moon, animal tracks, old trees, and we lay down in the leaves to listen to night-time sounds.

When we were in our pyjamas, we enjoyed hot chocolate and a movie before getting cosy in bed. The children were so sensible and brave, and even though we missed our mummies, we looked after each other and settled down quickly.

The next morning, the children stripped their beds and "packed their cases!" We served our friends again at breakfast, then we went into the woods to find the archery area. We definitely have some budding archers in Marigold Class! Afterwards, we climbed as high as we could on the climbing wall, and everyone pushed through their comfort zones to get a little bit higher.

Finally, we roasted marshmallows around the campfire and reflected on our experiences. All the children definitely developed their skills in independence, bravery, and resilience. Well done, and we are looking forward to the next one!

Tulip Class























In Maths this week, Year 3 have been looking at length and measurement, converting between metres and centimetres, and centimetres and millimetres. We have been deciding the best unit of measurement to use for school-based objects such as books, rubbers, glue sticks, and tables. In Year 4, we have finished our topic on perimeter, finding missing lengths in shapes using the measurements that we already know.

In English, we finished writing our hot task and started a brand new topic book: *Big Blue Whale* and *This Morning I Met a Whale*. We read the start of the story and learned about lots of species of birds, as well as learning some new vocabulary. We discussed where the River Thames was and considered the main character's senses as he walked down it.

In spelling, we continued to look at suffixes, this week focusing on '-ly' and the spelling rules we need to apply to different word endings. We enjoyed spelling some unusual words and talking about word meanings.

In History, we studied Hadrian's Wall and discovered why it was so important during the Roman invasion of Britain. We designed our own walls, using what we knew about soldier stations, personal belongings, and wall materials to help us. We completed some source work, looking at primary and secondary sources to tell us how we knew there were really soldiers at Hadrian's Wall. It was interesting to discuss which sources were more accurate and why.

Today, we celebrated World Book Day! We saw some fantastic Mr. Men and Little Miss costumes. We incorporated books into our lessons throughout the day. In English, we used the opening extract from *This Morning I Met a Whale* to predict what happened next. In Maths, we used books to support our learning with perimeter and measurement. In History, we used a variety of books about Ancient Rome to create leaflets and posters all about Roman times! We continued to read our class novel, *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe*, and recommended some of our favourite books to our classmates.

We have been working so hard to write our own myths and have used all of the different grammatical features we have been learning about to enhance the story and make it an enjoyable read for the reader. After completing our writing, we focused on editing to ensure that all punctuation, spelling and grammar had been used correctly. We are all really proud of our work and can't wait for our parents to see them next week.

We love participating in sporting events in Bluebell class and, this week, there were two events that we enjoyed being part of. On Tuesday, there were three teams who took part in the Dodgeball festival that took place at Frodsham Leisure Centre. They played lots of different teams and won many of their fixtures. The children returned with huge smiles on their faces, eager to share all about their afternoon. There were many positive comments from parents and staff about the sportsmanship displayed by the children at St Luke's and we are so proud of how well they represent our school.

This excellent attitude was also displayed on Thursday afternoon when our girls' football team took part in the FAVSP Girls' Football event that took place in Helsby. They demonstrated excellent skills and determination and we are so proud of them all. Thank you to all of the volunteers for their support when running these events.

Alongside all of the sporting events, we have been busy in the classroom, too. In this week's history lesson, we explored how the Tudor dynasty rose and found out all about the War of the Roses and the Battle of Bosworth and the significance they had in British history.

As this week marks the start of Lent, we discussed the importance of Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday. After attending the special Ash Wednesday Mass at church, we reflected on how we can make a difference to our own lives and the lives of others during this special time in the liturgical calendar.
